Parent's/Guardian's Reading Corner

Let's Get Your Child's Summer Reading Rolling!

Okay, it's summer and everyone is happy! Me too! But...you know your child needs to read during the summer and for some families that becomes a big battle. You want to win this war, but not just because the school says they have to read. Research shows that ongoing reading increases a person's vocabulary, background knowledge, skills in writing, and essentially makes them smarter. Reading is an activity that needs continual participation and support from the home.

Here are some ideas of how to make reading valuable, manageable, and enjoyable for your entire family.

1. Try to set a time and place that your family can read daily. Twenty minutes a day is great. Read yourself so you can be a good role model for your child.
2. Talk to your child about the kinds of books he/she likes to read. Ask a media specialist, English teacher, or Reading teacher for recommendations.
3. Pick out the books together. Be sure that the books are **not** too difficult. Make going to the library or bookstore a fun event.
4. Try reading your child's book on your own time, or get another copy and read along together.
5. Ask your child questions about the book. Who is their favorite character? What is the best part so far? Are any of the characters like you or someone you know? Was anything confusing in the book so far? What is the main idea of the story, and what do you think might happen next? How would you change the story if you could? The questions are infinite.
6. Talk about books you read in a fun and enjoyable tone. The car, the dinner table, the family room, etc. are all great places to share. Conversations do not have to be lengthy (just a few minutes), but on a regular basis.
7. Books can bring you to places you have never been, and into the minds of very exciting characters. As you read, it is **you** that imagines and visualizes this special world that is all your own. Enjoy your reading and have a great summer!

CONGRATULATIONS to all the 8th grade students moving up to High School. Remember.....keep up the hand washing!!

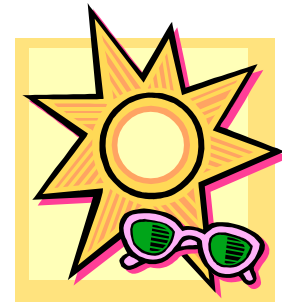
COUNSELORS' CORNER

Amity Students Audition on Broadway

On Saturday, April 29, six Amity Middle School students traveled to New York City accompanied by their parents and music/drama teacher Rebecca Geary. The students, Chelsea Roffman, Erik Shepherd, Benjie Ding, Melissa Vernik, Lauren Fox, and Daria Koren, were selected by Mrs. Geary to audition for a series of Broadway Junior workshops which will be run this summer by some of the most successful children's directors and choreographers in the country. Students auditioned for parts in *Thoroughly Modern Millie Jr*, *Suessical Jr*, *A Year With Frog and Toad Kids*, and *The Pirates of Penzance Jr*.

Students went into the auditions well-prepared, having rehearsed and memorized a Broadway song in the weeks prior to auditions. The big day started off with a tasty and entertaining meal at the famous Bubba Gump Shrimp Company in Times Square. Then it was off to auditions, where the Amity group was quickly ushered into a room with 34 other students from around the region. First they learned a short dance routine which they had to perform in small groups for the directors. Then it was time to sing. Happenings in the Grade 8 - Mega ACE Team

From April 24 through May 5, students on the Mega ACE Team studied Early American Cultures. This two week unit integrated English, social studies, and foreign language, exposing students to various aspects of culture throughout their classes. As part of this unit students traveled to the Pequot Museum where they experienced hands-on activities dealing with a newly-discovered archeological site and toured the exhibits in the museum.

Students participated in two team days that focused on early North and South American cultures. Student activities during this unit included the making of masks, dream catchers, totem poles, molas, beading, celebrating the buffalo, Indian design, reader's theater, patolli (an Aztec game), Mayan hieroglyphics, Mayan bingo, North and South American myths, and investigating the history of Cinco de Mayo. On Cinco de Mayo students were treated to a special lunch of soft tacos thanks to the efforts of Kate O'Donnell. We'd like to say a special thank you to Alexandra Buda, a student on our team with ties to Peru, who treated our classes to a special presentation of Peruvian culture and handicrafts.

PROJECT ADVENTURE

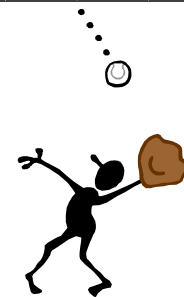

STUDENTS AGAINST DESTROYING DREAMS

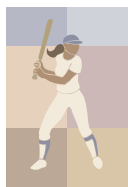
