College and Career of the Week: College and Career of the Week: This week's college is the **Rhode Island School of Design** and the career of the week is **Textile Designer**. The <u>Rhode</u> <u>Island School of Design</u> is located in Providence, Rhode Island approximately 112 miles from the BOW area. Founded in 1877, RISD is one of the most prestigious art colleges in the nation. With a student population of just over 2,500, RISD offers its students a "unique, studiobased learning" model, with "an emphasis on experimentation in the studio and beyond." <u>Annual costs</u> are approximately \$67,000 per academic year (tuition, fees, room and board). "<u>Textile designers</u> are involved in coming up with innovative ideas and developing commercially-appealing designs and prints for a variety of fabrics, clothing and non-clothing materials, furnishing materials, industrial fabrics and other related materials, using both natural and manmade fibers" (allaboutcareers.com). They usually work in design studios, factories and research labs. The median salary for <u>Fabric and Apparel Patternmakers</u> (a related profession) is \$49,690 per year (Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2017). Health Office Reminder: The health office has been seeing an increase in student visits for fevers. Students have been reporting they are still attending school despite having known fevers. As a reminder, students should not attend school if they have a fever. They should not return to school until they are fever free for 24 hours **WITHOUT** the use of Tylenol/Motrin. Senior Happenings

Attention seniors (and parents of seniors): We will soon begin the Senior Service Learning Program (SSLP), also known informally as the "internship program". *If you are interested in participating in this year's SSLP, please read on*. **SSLP 2020 will run** from May 18th until June 5th. **During this time, participating seniors will** become interns at predetermined job sites. If you are a senior in good standing (no attendance or discipline issues) and have at least a 2.0 unweighted GPA, you may qualify to participate in SSLP. <u>The first step is to</u> register for the mandatory, one-hour SSLP workshop. Please go to the Googleform here and register for the date and time that works best for you. If you have any registration issues, please contact me immediately.*Once you have attended the workshop, you can make the decision to participate in SSLP*. Seniors will also have the opportunity to do a "Senior Interest Project (SIP)" as an alternative to the SSLP. Information about SIP will be shared during the SSLP Workshop as well. Scholarship Opportunities for Seniors: Throughout the academic school year, local, state and federal organizations or agencies provide the opportunity for graduating seniors planning on pursuing post-high school education to apply for scholarships.
