College & Career of the Week: Spelman College is an HBCU (historically black college or university) college for women located in Atlanta, Georgia. Founded in 1881 as the "Atlanta Baptist Female Seminary", Spelman is recently ranked by US News & World Report as the #1 HBCU in the country. Just over 2,000 students are enrolled at Spelman where the most popular majors are biology and biomedical sciences, English, physical sciences, psychology and social sciences. Students are encouraged to participate in special programs such as "The Spelman MILE", an interdisciplinary curriculum or "G-STEM", promoting global research in STEM. Annual tuition, room and board is approximately \$35,000. Learn more by checking out Spelman's upcoming admissions events, viewing some fast facts or visiting their admissions website. Optometrists diagnose and treat visual problems and manage diseases, injuries, and other disorders of the eyes", (Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2019). Optometrists are employed in doctors' offices, in specialized retail outlets or in their own practices. To work as an optometrist, one must complete a four-year doctoral program, pass a

national board examination and obtain <u>a state license</u>. The average annual salary is \$115,250 with average job growth expected (4%) through 2029 (BLS, 2019). WORKING PAPERS are needed for formal employment by students under the age of 17. You may obtain working papers in the College & Career Center.
