ARHS is a large school, with over 1480 students, and it can sometimes feel a bit overwhelming because of the size. In an effort to make this larger school feel smaller, we have had, among other program, an advisory program at the high school for the past 15 vears. This program is called Spartan Seminar and is predicated on fostering connections among students, between students and adults in the building with whom the students do not necessarily have an academic class and a space for us to discuss, consider and reflect on our core values, beliefs and learning expectations. Throughout this year, we have focused specifically on our social and civic learning expectations through our Spartan Seminar program and this past week we discussed the value of integrity—specifically academic integrity (the lesson can be found here). As a community of learners, this value is of the utmost importance to maintaining a respectful and just school environment but it is also an integral part of upholding the intrapersonal responsibility we each have to being true to ourselves. During my discussion with a 9th grade Spartan Seminar, we discussed the dangers of cheating, including the loss of your own identity; when you cheat, you don't know where your own ability and potential ends and the cheating begins. I encourage you to take some time this weekend to discuss this Spartan Seminar lesson with your child. As we move in to this final stretch of the school year and we continue our focus on our academic, social and civic learning expectations, let us not lose sight of the core values and beliefs that anchor those expectations. College and Career of the Week: This week's college is **University of Delaware**, and the career of the week is **Chemical Engineer.** Known as the college where "study abroad originated", the <u>University of Delaware</u> sent its first group of

students abroad to Rome, Paris, Vienna, London and Geneva during the 1926-1927 school year. Today the university has grown to over 17,000 undergraduate students and approximately 3,700 graduate students, offering over 150 majors. Learn more at their website. Chemical Engineers use the principles of chemistry, biology, physics, and math to solve problems that involve the production or use of chemicals, fuel, drugs, food, and many other products. The median salary is approximately \$102,000 per year (Bureau of Labor Statitstics, 2017). Learn more from the professional association, the American Institute of Chemical Engineers. Happenings and Information

2019-2020 Scheduling Process: Parents MUST log on to Unified Classroom accounts and approve student requests by the end of the day today. Failure to do so may result in students not receiving courses that they requested. This approval process is your **LAST** chance to waive a level recommendation. Becoming an Ally Training: The Anti-Defamation League will be providing "Becoming an Ally" training to a select group of students on May 22nd. Students in grades 9-11 are encouraged to apply to participate in the training. This interactive training program is participatory, and provides practical opportunities to engage students in exploring the harms of name-calling and bullying and developing and practicing skills to respond to incidents. J. Hulley Foundation Sponsored Speaker: Author and journalist Jake Halpern will visit Amity Regional High School on Tuesday, March 12th to offer workshops to students in Media and English Language Arts classes. Mr. Halpern has worked as a journalist for the past twenty years. His work has appeared in *The*

New Yorker and New York Times Magazine, and includes non-fiction books such as Bad Paper, Fame Junkies, and Braving Home. Mr. Halpern recently was awarded the 2018 Pulitzer Prize for the online publication Welcome to the New World, a true story of a family of Syrian refugees. Mr. Halpern's visit promises to be a lively discussion on the power of non-fiction writing, which he sees as a "magical and a powerful way to tell stories about issues like refugee migration, which are otherwise often hard to grasp or get interested in." The event will be hosted by Amity librarians Robert Musco and Victoria Hulse and is made possible by the Jamie Hulley Arts Foundation.
