To get started:

- 1) Go to www.studyisland.com, click on log in, and then click school on the right.
- 2) Log in with the same username you use for PowerSchool and your password is your six-digit lunch ID plus your uppercase initials (123456JD). If you do not know your lunch ID, log into PowerSchool. It is next to your name at the top of the screen.
- 3) If a class has been set up for you student, click on My Classes, and choose the appropriate class. If not, skip to the paragraph below.
- 4) Click on the assignment.
